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# THE EUROPEAN UNION STRATEGY FOR THE DANUBE REGION

The Danube region represents one fifth of the European Union's total area and is home to more than 100 million inhabitants. The region is comprised of 9 EU (Austria, Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Germany, Hungary, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia) and 3 accession/candidate countries (Bosnia and Herzegovina, Montenegro and Serbia) and 2 Non-EU countries (The Republic of Moldova and Ukraine). The states show significant regional disparities in economic and social development. In order to increase growth and strengthen cooperation at a macro-regional level, the European Union in 2011 established the Danube Region Strategy (EUSDR.)

Key challenges to be tackled by the EUSDR are manifold: besides the fact that the participating countries are at vastly different stages in terms of their economic development, nearly all of the members are faced with different environmental issues. Cross-border cooperation in managing environmental issues is one of the priorities of the EUSDR and it represents the second, Environmental Pillar of the Strategy (apart other pillars of connectivity, strengthening socio-economic aspects and enhancing prosperity through better security and capacity-building.)







## **FOCUS ON FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES**

Six years after the launch of the EU Strategy for the Danube Region and approaching the edge of the current financing period of 2014-2020, cooperation between the Danube Countries has entered a new phase with even stronger focus on funding opportunities and specifically on more efficient use of funds. In 2015 in their Joint Statement the Ministers in charge of EU Funds, European Affairs or European Integration agreed that the success of the EUSDR implementation requires the alignment of relevant programmes and use of these EU Funds in line with the EUSDR Priority Areas and targets.

THE PRIORITY AREA
WATER QUALITY ACTIVE IN THE
ALIGNMENT OF FUNDING

The Danube has the most international river basin in the world: it stretches over 2,800 km across Europe. The Danube Basin covers an area of over 800,000 km², over 19 countries. The drainage area of the Danube is also influenced by two major mountain chains: the Alps and the Carpathians. Water management is therefore a central issue to the Danube Region, as water does not recognize borders and its management requires strong coordination and cooperation.

Hungary, together with Slovakia has been assigned to coordinate the water quality issues in the EUSDR and to ensure integrated water management towards reaching the good quality of waters in the Danube River Basin. The main decision- making body of the Priority Area is the Steering Group, comprised of representatives from all Danube Region countries.

To address the challenges related to water quality the coordination of EUSDR Priority Area Water Quality (PA4) chosen the following tools: cooperation with relevant institutions; alignment of funding; facilitating project implementation and networking towards setting up project consortiums. One of the most important tasks of EUSDR PA4 is therefore to facilitate the alignment of funding. The aim is to assist the improvement of water quality by incorporating the tasks/standards of the EUSDR to the documents and operational programs of the European Structural and Investment Funds as well as other financing frameworks. The EUSDR PA4 contributed to facilitate the alignment of funding in a structured and systematic way and made effective actions to embed the priority interventions to the EU programs of the "2014-2020 Multiannual Financial Framework".








The EUSDR PA4 adopted its alignment of funding document already in 2014; it regularly organizes stakeholder conferences and workshops to disseminate information about different funding programs and to provide platforms for stakeholders for cooperation and networking for the sake of establishing future consortiums. PA4 was active in recent years in assisting projects for Seed Money Facility START Danube Region Project Fund, for proposals to be set up for the Danube Strategic Project Fund (DSPF) and for proposals to be submitted under the Danube Transnational Programme's Seed Money Facility (SMF) apart facilitating project preparation for different larger programs.

# IMPACT IN DECISION-MAKING AND THE IMPORTANCE OF MACRO REGIONAL APPROACH DURING PROJECT SELECTION

To support embedding macro regional needs into different programs, the representatives of the Danube Region Strategy are sitting at different management committees of several relevant programs, namely different operative, transnational or cross border programs to ensure that the views and interests of macro-regionals stakeholders are heard and that



their opinions are taken into consideration, as early as in the program planning phase. This is especially important in light of the upcoming new programming period post 2020.

The above cross cutting impact is twofold as several regional and EU-wide funding programmes created their rules concerning how they are taking the macro-regional approach into account during the project selection process, to support the implementation of such strategies. At the same time, funding programs recognized – especially those under the INTERREG umbrella – the benefit of them strengthened cooperation with a macro-regional strategy (MRS), namely the long- term sustainability



of project results provided through the permanent political and professional framework of an MRS. In many case the substantial relevance with the strategic aims is an added value and projects could receive valuable points during the evaluation process. The connection with an EUSDR Priority Area (PA) cannot be more securely confirmed and stated towards the funding instruments than with the help of a Letter of Recommendation (LoR) received from the Strategy itself.

# THE PROJECT LABELLING PROCEDURE WITHIN THE ENVIRONMENTAL PILLAR OF THE EUSDR

The Environmental Pillar of the EUSDR established a common procedure for labelling projects. The same method applies for the labelling process under Priority Areas Watewscription of the project on the joint Project Data Sheet of Pillar-B containing fundamental project information and relevance. The sheet shall be completed in English and shall be submitted via e-mail to at least one of the two co-coordinators of the concerned Priority Area. Submission of project (idea) descriptions is continuous. The labelling of a project is carried out through consensual decision of the Steering Group (SG) members of the concerned PA. Decisions are taken at SG meetings or through written procedures.

In practical terms, nearly 20 Danube basin water related projects and ideas were introduced in the frame of the high-level working group of the Water Quality Priority Area (Steering Group (SG) meetings) since 2011. Projects were introduced to the SG, assisted to be set up or selected for different funding instruments from general EU funding possibilities to specific EUSDR funding (Danube Region Project Funds START and TAF, or to the Danube Strategic Project Fund (DSPF). The EUSDR PA4 coordination team regularly informs its stakeholders of the different funding possibilities.

However, a LoR does not automatically imply that financing is granted to the project. In order to get financing projects must comply with the governing rules of the financing source and must successfully pass the



specific evaluation phases. Nevertheless, a LoR makes obvious that the project idea is highly accepted by the relevant sectoral organizations of the Danube region.

Therefore, it effectively helps assessors to come to a positive decision. An example of a positive result of the above support is the JOINTISZA project that was awarded funding within the Danube Transnational Programme, being implemented since 1 January 2017.



## FINANCING WATER NEEDS IN THE EU

#### **USUALLY NO SPECIFIC HEADING FOR WATER**

There are no specific programmes financing exclusively water needs in the EU. However, several funding possibilities exist that could be appropriate to finance different water- related projects, for example in Hungary the Environmental Operative Programme contains separate priorities for integrated water projects and also examples are to be found in other countries, such the Rural Development Programme in Bulgaria. One needs to distinguish whether to search in sector-specific programmes or consider funding within different decentralized funding programmes via regional or national channels.






#### **DIFFERENT FINANCIAL VOLUMES**

- ▶ Thematic objectives to be supported by the programme and its assimilation to the EUSDR priority areas: Building a low-carbon, climate resilient future: climate action in support of the Paris Agreement; Greening the economy in line with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)
- Available budget per categories to be supported: 2018: 703.5 m EUR. 2019: 762.95 m EUR. 2020: 643.95 m EUR
- Expected date of calls, submission dates: opening: 7 November 2017, deadlines: 27 February, 2018 (1st stage), 4 September, 2018 (2nd stage), 19 February, 2019 (1st stage), 4 September, 2019 (2nd stage)
- Eligible partners: participants from Member States, Associated States, Third Countries
- Typical project size (budget) and duration: budget: varies from topic to topic, duration: varies, most common 3 years
- Expected oversubscribed based on the experiences: Average success rate for the whole of Horizon 2020: 11,6%, it varies from programme to programme

#### **Links to EUSDR PA4**

DTP Seed Money Facility (SMF): To support the development of complex strategic transnational projects contributing to the EU Strategy for the Danube Region, projects that will apply for funding from any other EU, national or other funding sources

Open call for seed money projects, Targeted only to a limited number of topics for each EUSDR Priority Area

Two and maximum five financing partners from at least two different DTP countries of the programme area: the Lead Partner and at least one project partner.

#### SMF CALL:

open till 7 December 2017, decision in 2018. Max. project budget 50,000 EUR.

- Fixed project duration: 12 months
- Lead Partner located on the territory of an EU MS
- ▶ Local, regional, national public bodies/ bodies governed by public law (including EGTCs in the meaning of Article 2(16) of Regulation (EU) No 1303/2013)
- International organisations
- Private non-profit bodies
- Private enterprises are not eligible



#### DTP 3RD CALL:

TBD (possibly from end 2018–early 2019)

- Funding sources: ERDF / IPA / ENI
- 85% EU funding rate
- Eligible partners: Public / International / Private\*;
- Typical project: 1,5 3 M EUR with duration of 30-36 months (regular project)

**INTERREG CE 3RD CALL:** Thematic objectives to be supported by the programme and its assimilation to the EUSDR priority areas:

- 4 Priority Axes (including 10 programme specific objectives SOs):
- P1 Innovation (TO 1) EUSDR Priority areas 7, 8 and 9
- P2 Low carbon (TO 4) EUSDR Priority area 2
- P3 Environment and culture (TO 6) EUSDR Priority areas 3, 4, 5 and 6
- P 4 Transport (TO 7) EUSDR Priority areas 1A and 1B

**Available budget** per categories to be supported: Total programme budget for projects: ca. 231 m EUR ERDF (out of which ca. 88,8 m EUR ERDF for projects under Priority axis 3 Environment and culture)

Eligible partners (territorial and institutional eligibility criteria);

- National, regional and local public bodies
- Private institutions, including private companies
- International organisations under national law and, with restrictions, under international law

#### Minimum partnership requirements:

- At least 3 partners from 3 countries (of which 2 from the CENTRAL EUROPE area)
- Possibility of involving partners located outside the programme area, if duly justified (up to 20% of the total ERDF contribution to the project)

#### Typical project size (budget) and duration;

Duration: 24 to a maximum of 36 months (latest possible end date 31 December 2021)

#### Recommended size:

- Total budget of 1-5 m EUR (average budget of about 2,1 m EUR)
- Maximum partnership size of 12 partners (average of 10 partners,, larger partnerships also possible, if justified)
- Expected oversubscribed based on the experiences (ratio between the submitted and endorsed/winner projects proposals);
- Success rate of 2nd call proposals (one-step procedure) of about 24%

#### Requriements:

- Cooperation between regions for answering to common challenges and shared needs
- Novel solutions and their pilot implementation
- Transfer of existing knowledge for better solutions
- Creating opportunities, seeding larger investments

The next call for proposals is expected to open in early 2019!

## DANUBE STRATEGY ADDITIONALITY

PROJECTS CAN GIVE SIGNIFICANT INPUT TO THE ACTIONS AND/ OR CAN SERVE AS A PILOT ACTIVITIES OR GOOD EXAMPLES RELEVANT IN BASIN- WIDE SCALE.

#### Succesful examples:

- Setting up the first European Territorial Cooperation Area with a Non-EU country with EUSDR help (Szabolcs county-Kisvárda, Transcarphatia)
- Danube-Pannon region cooperation with 6 cities (HU-HR-SR)
- Assistance in UA for urban-waste water issues, Solotvyno salt mine
- Danube START: Financing feasibility of UWWT in Beregove, UA
- PA4: WFD, UWWT implementation: discussion with SG members, identification of further needs, fill gaps (buffer strips, UWWT small settlements)

#### **HOW TO SET UP A GOOD PROJECT?**

- 1. **step:** Clear targets: the project idea is ready
- **2. step:** Search for appropriate funding depending on the project characteristics
- **3. step:** Partner search and project design

- Provide assistance in setting up consortiums for proposals
- Assist in sub- basin cooperation
- Promote partner search
